

The stark reality is that we continue to fall short of our budgeted goal of \$7,500 in collections for the Church. This gap impacts our ability to provide essential services, outreach programs, and maintain the infrastructure that supports our community's spiritual and educational needs.

We urge each of you, as valued members of our St. Mary family, to reflect on the role that our Church and School play in our lives and in the lives of our children. Your support, in whatever form it may take, is not just a donation; it is an investment in the future of our faith and the education of our children.
